## LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT AND CHAIRWOMAN

Dear Friends,

Throughout 2009, many New Jerseyans faced unprecedented difficulty making ends meet, with unemployment, a weak economy and continued high energy prices forcing many households into a bill payment crisis. For those with limited or fixed incomes, a bill payment crisis can quickly spiral out of control, jeopardizing a family's finances as well as their ability to provide life-sustaining home heating, food and medicine for their families.

NJ SHARES plays a critical role for those who do not qualify for other assistance programs. Last year, thanks to the support of our governor, legislators, agency partners and friends, NJ SHARES continued to make a difference for thousands of our neighbors across the state. Last year, we helped 20,000 vulnerable households with one-time grants for energy assistance.

We were able to achieve this thanks to several important sources of funding. First, we received \$10 million in New Jersey's Economic Stimulus Bill to help families in crisis last winter. We were also the recipient of \$5 million in Energy Assistance funding, included in the state budget,

for natural gas, oil, propane and electric grants. And, Escheats Legislation resulted in \$1.4 million in funds for natural gas and electric utility bills. In addition, funding from the Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative – via the Board of Public Utilities – provided a groundbreaking and innovative funding source.

Yet despite having the funding to help 20,000 households this year, NJ SHARES was forced to turn away thousands more who needed our help. In these difficult economic times, with New Jersey unemployment hovering around 10 percent, it is more important than ever for government officials, legislators and other supporters to recognize that we have much more work ahead of us. We continue to create new alliances that will strengthen our ability to provide an energy assistance safety net.

The support we have received this year has been inspiring and has come in many forms: innovative funding solutions, an invitation to contribute to the Governor's Energy working group, additional contributions from energy providers, expertise from the Agency Advisory Council and much more.

We would like to express our gratitude to our agency partners, without whom we could never achieve our mission.

The success we celebrate this year is due to the support of many. We cannot thank you enough.

## NJ SHARES EXPANDS ITS PROGRAMS

NJ SHARES has expanded energy assistance to include deliverable fuels through partnerships with the Fuel Merchants and Propane Gas Associations in New Jersey. Because energy bill payment crises can also extend to water and telephone, NJ SHARES is now “making a splash” with its involvement with two major water companies, New Jersey American Water and United Water. In addition, we continue to connect our communities by administering Verizon’s Communication Lifeline and Link-Up America programs, providing discounted telephone service to low income and senior citizen households.

In October, NJ SHARES officially took over the administration of two programs for New Jersey American Water, “H2O To Help Others” and the “Low Income Payment Program” (LIPP). Since 2005, NJ SHARES has been administering United Water Cares in New Jersey and in eight additional states. We are thrilled to be leveraging our energy expertise to help vulnerable households keep their water running — across New Jersey and in other states as well.

NJ SHARES continued in its role as the New Jersey administrator for Verizon Communication’s Lifeline and Link-Up America. These programs serve a vital role in helping low income households stay connected with telephone service. In September, NJ SHARES partnered with the New Jersey Board of Public Utilities and Verizon to raise awareness for the programs during National Telephone Discount Lifeline Awareness Week, a special week-long event dedicated to publicizing the programs.

In March, NJ SHARES opened a new call center to provide information on a variety of assistance programs for low income people, as well as for individuals and families in the midst of a temporary financial crisis. The new call center, which NJ SHARES is operating on behalf of the NJ Department of Community Affairs (DCA), kicked off with staff members who have been specially trained to offer a broad array of program information to households that are struggling to pay their energy bills.

Adams award by the National Fuel Fund Network (NFFN) at the National Energy and Utility Affordability Conference. The award, recognizing institutional innovation and achievement, was named in honor of fuel fund pioneer, the late Victorine Q. Adams. NJ SHARES’ receipt of the award in 2009 coincided with NFFN’s 25th anniversary celebration.

## 2010 LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

Acting Governor Stephen Sweeney signed legislation on January 15th to provide NJ SHARES with \$25 million in funding for energy bill assistance. The funding, which will be available on July 1, will allow NJ SHARES to assist limited and moderate income New Jersey households in crisis who cannot afford their energy bills and do not qualify for the Federal Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program.

The funds, which have no impact on taxpayers or utility customers, could potentially help 32,000 households stay safe in their homes through the 2010-2011 heating season.

The bill was passed with bipartisan support. Primary sponsors included Sandra B. Cunningham, Upendra J. Chivukula, Vincent Prieto, Wayne P. DeAngelo and Annette Quijano. Acting Governor Sweeney signed the bill at AARP Headquarters in Forrestal Village.

"Providing funding so NJ SHARES can help families and seniors keep warm over the winter is simply the right thing to do," said Sweeney. "Even though economists tell us the recession is waning, we see first-hand how many families still need the type of help NJ SHARES provides. I applaud the hard work of all the legislative sponsors, NJ SHARES and AARP for never letting up until this bill was signed."

## FAMILIES GRATEFUL FOR ASSISTANCE

I hold a part time job, but it doesn't provide a steady income. I don't have set days – they call me when they need me, and often I have trouble making ends meet. In particular, I was having difficulty keeping up with my PSE&G bill.

PSE&G put me on a payment plan, but due to reduced hours at work, it was not always easy to make the payments. At church one Sunday, I came across the newspaper put out by Mercer County Hispanic Association, a social service agency that works with NJ SHARES. The Agency provided information about energy assistance programs, with instructions on how to apply.

By providing me with assistance to pay my utility bill, NJ SHARES not only provided me with energy, it also helped me arrange my finances so I would have money for food, medicine and other things necessary for everyday survival. I work hard and I do the best I can to meet my financial responsibilities, but it's great to know that NJ SHARES was there to provide help when I needed it.

NJ SHARES participated in 258 collaborative events this year – nearly tripling last year’s efforts. Nationally, NJ SHARES was featured in highly respected forums.

In January, NJ SHARES was highlighted as operating a best practices call center at the 4th Annual Call Center Summit in Orlando, Florida. Kimberly Warrick, NJ SHARES’ Client Service Call Center Manager, presented the workshop, *Connecting with Empathy During an Uncertain Economy*.

In February, NJ SHARES joined 200 advocates at the National Fuel Fund Network’s LIHEAP Action Day in Washington, D.C. to urge Congress to continue funding LIHEAP at a level of at least \$5.1 billion and to include additional funding for this vital program that assists disadvantaged Americans in paying their heating and cooling bills in the stimulus bill.

In June, NJ SHARES was an active presenter at this year’s National Energy and Utility Affordability Conference (NEUAC), held in Portland, Oregon. The conference included such topics as energy availability and sustainability, outreach and advocacy, vulnerable populations, weatherization and conservation, and energy assistance and education.

NJ SHARES participated in two of the discussion tracks, addressing outreach and vulnerable populations. Barbara M. Gomes, NJ SHARES Director of Outreach and Communications, presented at the NEUAC Grassroots Outreach and Volunteer Training workshop, where she shared best practices and ideas on effective ways to conduct outreach and collaborative advocacy.

Jim Jacob, NJ SHARES President and CEO, was a plenary session speaker covering Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiatives (RGGI), and how RGGI funding is already benefitting vulnerable communities. Jim also discussed RGGI in a hot topic session and presented a few other workshops titled, *LIHEAPing and Bounding into the Void: Addressing the Needs of the Newly Vulnerable*, where he addressed the best way to reach people who are facing energy bill payment crisis for the first time.

In the *New Face of Poverty: Ask the Experts* session, Jim Jacob discussed how the challenging economy and increased unemployment has led to a more varied constituency for energy assistance. The workshop looked at some of the issues facing the new poor and the stresses their needs place on the existing network.

# NJ SHARES SUCCESS STORY

I'm a single mom and have always made ends meet, but my problems started after I got a series of injuries to my wrist and knee. I was out on disability for several months, with considerable pain and difficulty doing normal activities.

During this difficult period, I had to pay people to drive my daughter to school, purchase groceries and prepare meals. The doctors I needed to see were far from my home, so I also struggled with high gas prices for the long drive. Meanwhile, my daughter was being bullied at school, so I had no choice but to send her to a private school. Before long I got behind on my bills, including my electric bill.

I heard about NJ SHARES from a friend. I applied, and they responded with a grant to help me clear my debt to the electric company. One less bill to worry about meant I could concentrate on providing food and a safe environment for my daughter.

When you reach out for help, one of the greatest feelings is knowing that someone is going to reach back. NJ SHARES is a wonderful advocate for working people in crisis, and I'm so grateful they were there for me and my daughter.
